### **The Ill-fated Tacoma Train Trip**



After weeks of planning, the morning of June 20th arrived for a trip to Tacoma to visit the PSMRE HO layout. At several stations in Northwest Washington including Bellingham, Mount Vernon and Stanwood or more members gathered for the anticipated visit to the Washington State History Museum which houses the layout, but more importantly for the train ride down south.

It soon became apparent that the train was running late as the arrival time in Bellingham came and went. Then word came in from Amtrak that the run was actually officially delayed. After several hours as updated arrival times came and went. Amtrak finally announced that the train was going to be running very late and that passengers would be able to cancel their tickets and receive a refund. At this point most of the entourage opted to cancel their plans, take the refund

and head for home. However some hardy optimists decided that the train ride was too exciting to give up and decided to wait it out.

Mark Malmkar, Levi and his mother Rocio Reyes caught the train in Mount Vernon running 2 and a half hours late and were joined by Dale Bearden and Karl Kleeman in Stanwood. Mark says of the trip, "Levi was a typical 6th grader. He was so excited he could hardly sit still. It wasn't a bad trip. We arrived in Tacoma about 2 1/2 hours late, of course. Dale and Carl heard from a trainman that they could upgrade their trip and continue to Portland and catch the northbound 518 back. They stayed on the 517 train. Levi, his mom and I, got off."

But what had caused the delay? Bob Stafford was able to ascertain the reason later that same day. According to Bob, "There is a slow order on the mainline switch at Custer where last week's derailment happened when a train ran through a switch. As Train 517 was going through the slow order a person tried to jump onto the side of the Amtrak train to ride it by hanging onto it. This person fell under the train and was killed."

Meanwhile back at the Tacoma station, Mark said, "Inside the depot we found out the northbound 518 was delayed, also. (the trainman told Dale and Karl the "same" train would turn around and become the 518. It didn't happen.) Dale and Karl got trapped in Portland because the 517 and 518 passed each other, just as we feared.." Mark continued saying, "Finally, at 7:00 pm the three of us

got on the 518 north. We got to Mount Vernon at 10:00 pm. The way things worked, we probably could have visited the museum as we had about 4 hours in Tacoma." I reached out to Dale and Karl to get their take on the adventure, but have yet to hear back. Levi's mother Rocio did say, "Well, it was a little stressful but for Levi it was such a great dream to travel by train that despite what happened we went. For my son it was very fun and he had a very happy time. Since his birthday is approaching I wanted him to fulfill his dream of traveling by train."
